Below left we can see the space left after D49 was taken out onto the main pontoon ready for the Navy Days Weekend, well nearly ready. All that was needed



have to say for a sea-cock it does dazzle the eye a bit. Other work carried: out on 1502 has been fitting a new transom rubbing strip, a complete

HSL 102 Refit Programme - This was brought about by several aspects, 1- To obtain her coding, 2- to bring up her overall appearance to a showroom standard for her trip to the Southampton Boat Show where she is



planned to take to centre stage. 3- to correct some minor problems with her engines. Over left we can see the team getting stuck in repainting the deck. This proved to take much longer than planned due to the vagaries of the weather and

also getting the colour right. The guys involved in this were Peter, Terry, Rob, Danny, Tony, Fred, Spud, Whaler John, Alan 1, Alan a Dale and Dave 4, apologies to anyone that I have missed out. All of her teak was stripped, cleaned and oiled back to the original colour. Alan 2 and his mate Gordon (not Bennett) fitted a new VHF Radio aerial whilst Fred made a tiddly radio console for the new radio and the bilge alarms which Mack varnished. The engine fuel lines were refitted to the new filter setup and the bilge pumps were rewired to reduce excessive voltage drop. No wonder they didn't run properly. All in all she kept a few of us busy. Whaler Excellent - She progressed with Spud, Alan1



and Sadie keeping her ticking over. Below left is a shot of Alan 1 fitting his new stem gratings together. We have all waited for this moment and I felt it warranted a special mention. He looks quite chuffed with himself and despite the loss of his roll of 'lino' from under his left arm he has done brilliant job. Watch this space for the next stage when he hands the

gratings over to Mack for their glossy coat of varnish. Motor Whaler - Ian and Rob managed to make progress on this boat. Rob has pushed on with the stem post rebuild whilst lan has nearly completed the bows. I have got some photos of lan sanding off the hull but due to lack of editorial space I will try to give them justice next month.

During August we produced a separate set of 'work to' sheets for each of the current prime boats in an endeavour to keep everyone up to date with what is needed, aid job planning and achieve some training. HSL 102 - Finish fitting the battery charging circuits in place and fit wire up the new anchor winch. Build a grating / walkway in the forward section of engine room midline. Complete all of the outstanding 'Coding' tasks.

MGB 81 - All work is currently being done by outside contractors at the old Camper Nicholson's site.

Crew Training - Following Navy Days it has become apparent that we need to train up some more coxswains for our local boats along with some additional crew training so that the left hand can keep track of what the right hand is doing. Particularly nice when coming alongside or leaving with visitors.

Ariadne - Figure head refit on hold until further notice. Osborne - Weekly checks on state of boat and surrounding stand.

25 Foot Motor Launch Ark Royal - Finish the small covers and agree the display format and location.

Admiralty Pattern 14 Ft. - Work held pending completion of current work load.

32 Foot Rowing Cutter - Keep a watching brief on her now she is held in the tunnel.

Landing Craft - Fit some low volume pumps with batteries and solar panel similar to Cyclops. Improved access.

20 Foot Cutter - The engine needs to serviced and restored before it can be fitted back into the hull. Work held pending completion of current work load.

15 Foot Fast Motor Boat - . Currently on hold.

1502 - Fit new ignition switches and resolve remote engine stop problem finish current programme and service the engines.

Main Pontoon - Construct a power stanchion to incorporate the twin solar panels.
